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## How to Have Healthy Dog Teeth

#### 1 Pick the Right Tools

We've all heard the common saying that a dog's mouth is cleaner than a human's. But, that doesn't mean that your pooch shouldn't practice good dental hygiene. According to Dr. Sarah Wooten, DVM, consulting veterinarian for BigBarker.com and small-animal veterinarian of Greeley, CO, "Like people, without proper dental care, dogs and cats develop... plaque and tartar, [harboring] harmful bacteria that eats away at gingival tissue, causing gum recession, and ultimately, bone loss around the tooth. This condition is... also extremely hard on your pet's health, as bacteria from the mouth enters the bloodstream through the infected tissue and causes additional wear and tear on the internal organs." So, when preparing to brush your pet's teeth, be sure you have the right tools for the job to make the task simple, quick and easy for you and your pup. The Vetoquinol Vet Solutions Enzadent Enzymatic Poultry-Flavored Toothbrush Kit for Dogs & Cats is a great starter kit that contains both a traditional-style, dual-ended toothbrush as well as a handy finger brush, depending on your and your pet's personal preferences. #### 2 Get Up Close and Personal

Many pet owners know that new experiences—even positive ones—can be a challenge for timid animals. Because brushing may not be on the list of top fun activities for your dog, many owners tend to throw in the towel as soon as their pet puts up a fight. Remember that the unknown can be very scary to certain animals, and perhaps a longer and slower acclimation period is all that is needed to make your furry best friend comfortable with a new routine. "If your pet is shy, start by just letting [him] lick the toothpaste off your finger while you pet him, [but] make sure it is non-fluoride, animal toothpaste and not human toothpaste," says Wooten. "[Then,] gently rub a small amount of toothpaste on the teeth in front and, [using a circular motion, gently scrub each tooth]. You can gradually work your way to the back of the mouth and introduce a brush, but go slowly and make sure your pet is comfortable with the procedure." For starters, the Nylabone Advanced Oral Care Dog Finger Brush is a great option. This small tool can be less intimidating to your pup while allowing you to use your finger to maneuver the cracks and crevices of your pet's mouth. The soft rubber bristles are designed to reach even the hardest of areas where plaque and tartar build up. This handy brush can help make establishing a daily dental care routine simple, quick and easy.

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Like with most training, starting early can make a big difference in your pet's comfort when it comes to getting used to a new regimen. "Most pets can be trained to accept a toothbrush within 1-3 weeks, and you don't have to brush every day," says Wooten. "Just make sure to brush every 72 hours at a minimum, because that is how long it takes for plaque to turn into tartar." For more eager and confident pups, the Virbac C.E.T.
